

Flooding in Maroondah


Dandenong Creek near H.E. Parker Reserve, Heathmont

 - › Scenario based planning



The trauma sets in

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Angry Arthur Creek and Strathewen firefighters have accused the CFA of letting them down in the wake of Black Saturday.

Now, months later, after the midfives many of the traumatised volunteers – including six who lost their houses and are still in temporary accommodation – are receiving a phone call from CFA headquarters.

The majority has not received

counselling or psychological assessment. Some are considering quitting due to the lack of support.

The CFA says help was available, but it fell to members to take up the offers.

Arthur Creek volunteers Goodwin and Norris said the whole brigade should have been offered help by a psychologist. "We've not been asking for

handouts, but you'd at least like a place call from someone," Mr Norris said. "The other guys are just grinning and bearing it, but I think they're suffering."

He said volunteers like Warren Rees, who has been living alone near the ruins of his Strathewen home, were reluctant to seek help. "I was mentally prepared for this to

happen so I don't think it's affected me as much as some of the others," Mr Rees said.

Rugton HQ general manager Gill McGehee was surprised at all the allegations. She said a training manual had been developed and psychologists, as well as legal support and a chaplain, were sent to the staging areas. She said volunteers could

not be "forced" to undergo psychological assessment, as it was up to brigades captains to refer members in trouble for more help.

Volunteer captain David McGahey said he had been asked to leave, but some who are seriously affected had "slipped through the cracks".

"The amount of responsibility left to volunteers is phenomenal and in some cases unfair," Mr McGahey said. "There has to be time for paid people to come in."

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Challenges









Working in local government, to what extent are you influenced by disaster risk reduction plans at state and national levels or can you really just do your own thing?

- › Local government are in conflicted positions, on one hand we are established to enact regulatory standards of State Governments and on the other deliver, facilitate and advocate for services that improve community health, wellbeing and social connections that are so important to building community resilience.
- › In some instances... we have to do our own thing, but I would call it community centred leadership. We become leaders and something that others look to for inspiration. Councils need to plan, lead and advocate for change based on community needs. Our community expects us to. This can be more complex when it is not a priority at state and federal levels.
