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Key themes

Mel – Emotional Impacts:

- Managing the long-term psychological impacts of an increasingly complex disaster landscape

Anne – Clean Up:

- Managing the challenges of the clean-up. Renegotiating relationships with possessions, dealing with looting and scavenging, the impacts of untrained and overzealous helpers, and an appeal for support with help literacy

Heather – Flood Data:

- issues with accessibility to good quality data, trust in the accuracy of data for local flood risk management, and ongoing flood literacy issues

Mike – Localised Perspective:

- The need for focus at the local level and inclusion of local knowledge. Rejection of official information due to lack of local relevance. Having local knowledge rejected

Kat – Community Responders

- The changing role of communities and integration into emergency management. The good and bad impacts of disaster on communities, and communities planning for future response
